
C. J. MOTTU. Geneva, 1903 to 1926.

Association, 1912 to 1926.

It is with very great regret we record the death of C. J. Mottu owing to injuries received from a motor bus on his 79th birthday. He was born at Geneva and came to England when 22 years of age, and had resided at Teddington 42 years with his wife, Madame Mottu (the head of a very successful High School at Summerleigh). He had devoted his whole life to banking and was for many years with the Anglo-Foreign Bank in London, of which he was manager. He was well-known and highly respected amongst the Swiss community in London and for three years he won the veteran race at the Annual Swiss Sports in London. He was with his wife a constant visitor to Saas Fee and was present at the opening of Cabane Britannia in 1912, and as recently as 1925 at the dinner of the Association at Saas Fee. kindly disposition and gentle manner endeared him to us all and he was a frequent attendant at our dinners. Our sympathy goes out to Madame Mottu, almost one of ourselves, who replied to the toast of the Ladies, at our meeting at Saas Fee last August. We annex a photograph.

THE OBJECTS OF THE ASSOCIATION, ETC.

The Association of British Members of the S.A.C. was founded in 1909 with the double purpose of providing a meeting place for climbers and those interested

in the Alps, particularly for beginners, who very often have little opportunity of meeting those interested in mountaineering, and at the same time to encourage men in this country to join the Swiss Alpine Club, as well as to make it easy for them to do so. The Association was an instant success, and it has created good feeling among the Swass now that they see the majority of the British Climbers, who use their huts, contributing to their support by becoming members of the S.A.C. The British were always held in high estimation in Switzerland, but there is no doubt that the existence of the Association has done very much to increase that feeling, and the presentation of the Britannia Hut to the S.A.C. did a great deal in that direction as well. The Association has been able in many ways in the past to represent the views of British mountaineers to their Swiss colleagues and has always been viewed by the S.A.C. with the greatest sympathy, and on all occasions any requests of ours have been dealt with with great cordiality. It is particularly gratifying to us to be referred to in Die Alpen as "a precious auxiliary to our Club," also by the President of the Geneva Section as follows, in his presidential address:

Nous avons le privilège de posséder hors des murs de la cité, au-delà de nos frontières, par delà la mer, des collègues, plus que des collègues, des amis qui bien que ne pouvant pas venir réchauffer leur zèle pour le C.A.S. à notre foyer familial, pensent à nous, se réunnissent pour s'entretenir des mêmes sujets que Ce sont les membres de l'Association des Membres anglais du C.A.S. Chaque mois nous avons de leurs nouvelles par les listes de nouveaux adhérents qu'ils nous envoient. Il est touchant de voir la fidélité de ces amis épris, de nos beautés alpestres, qui ne veulent pas profiter de nos travaux sans apporter également leur pierre à l'édifice. Qu'ils soient assurés de toute notre reconnaissance et qu'ils nous permettent de leur dire notre regret de ne pas les connaître personnellement et de ne pas avoir l'occasion de leurs visites de temps en temps. Je leur envoie cependant un cordial salut.

The Association is now a large one, numbering 555, and the Hon. Treasurer has continued to collect on behalf of most of the Sections which contain British Members the Annual Subscriptions for 1925. The total sum so collected amounted to £623 10s. 2d. in small sums for 11 Sections.

About 640 British Members belong to some section of S.A.C., and 550 of these are members of our Association. Over 350 belong to Geneva Section.

The S.A.C. in 1924 had over 23,000 members, belonging to 80 Sections. There are over 90 Huts.

The proposal, referred to in our last Report, for having a uniform subscription to the S.A.C. for all members of our Association, whatever Section they belong to, has not gone any further during the year, but there is still a possibility of negotiations in the matter proceeding. In the last few years, the changes in the subscriptions to the various Sections has been a very difficult one for the Hon. Treasurer; what with alterations in the value of the franc, the raising of subscriptions by the sections and so on. The latest change is the compulsory addition of 2.50 francs. to

the subscription of every member of the S.A.C., as an insurance premium, for a sum of 10,000 francs in case of total disablement or death.

OFFICIAL JOURNAL OF S.A.C.-LES ALPES.

We congratulate the Central Committee on the excellence of the new Club publication "Die Alpen" (or "Les Alpes"), in particular on the series of wonderful photographs which have appeared throughout the year.

CLUB ROOMS AND LIBRARY.

The greatest difficulty the Association has had to face during the year was caused by the fact that Gatti's, in a re-organisation, found that they were unable to house us any more. We received notice of this in the summer, and were only able to hold one dinner there after the summer holidays, but found it impossible to hold our usual autumn Ladies' Dinner. After much search and negotiation we were able to find a home at the Comedy Restaurant, 38, Panton Street. Here we have a room which is open on Wednesday evenings for the use of members and where the Library is now housed. The room may be used at other times when not engaged for any other purposes. The monthly informal dinners will be held at the Comedy Restaurant in a room which is best entered by the side door in Oxenden Street.

As the room available for dining is not large enough for the Annual Dinner and Ladies' Dinner, these assemblies will have to be held elsewhere. The Committee are not able at present to arrange for these dinners to be always at the same place, so that members are asked to read carefully the special notices which will be sent out. It is hoped that it will be possible to settle on one Hotel or Restaurant for these larger meetings and to stick to it. It is unfortunate that there seems no prospect of getting as reasonable terms for the larger dinners as at Gatti's, but the cost will be little greater.

A catalogue of the Library will be found in the Club Room, and is also included in this report.

Gifts of Books for the Library will be gratefully received by the Hon. Librarian, C. T. Lehmann, Woldingham House, Woldingham, Surrey. Our thanks are due to him for housing our books, etc., during the change of localty.

THE ANNUAL DINNER.

Our Annual Dinner was held on November 25th, 1925, at Victoria Hotel, Northumberland Avenue. Dr. H. L. R. Dent, our President, took the Chair, and about 118 were present. The speakers were our President, Dr. H. L. R. Dent, General the Hon. C. G. Bruce (President of the Alpine Club), Sir Martin Conway, M.P., E. S. Herbert, J. A. B. Bruce, Hon. Treasurer and A. N. Andrews, Hon. Secretary. In consequence of the death of Queen Alexandra it was decided to have no public report of the proceedings.

THE MONTHLY DINNERS AND MEETINGS.

The Club Room is open, as mentioned above, in each month, with exceptions below, an informal dinner is held at the Comedy Restaurant at 7.30 p.m. on the 4th Wednesday in each month, unless special notice is given to the contrary. Members wishing dine should communicate with Secretary, A. N. Andrews, 21, St. Stephen's Square, W.2., as early as possible, stating the fact they wish to bring guests. The price of the dinner is 5/6. It has been usual to invite ladies to certain of these monthly dinners. On these occasions there is generally a large attendance and a larger room may have to be engaged, probably at another restaurant. The same is true of the Annual Dinner in November. At the Ladies' Dinner slides are shown when possible. Special notice of these larger dinners will be given.

On occasion of the informal dinners, members not able to dine may always rely on meeting others after dinner. In August and December there will be no

meeting.

DATES OF DINNERS IN 1926.

January 27th, February 23rd, March 24th, April 28th, May 26th, June 23rd, July 28th, September 22nd,

October 27th. The Annual Dinner for 1926 will be held in November on a date to be announced later, but if possible on the 24th.

In event of any change in the above dates, special notice will be sent out.

MEETINGS, ETC., IN 1925.

The usual informal dinners and meetings took place, and there was a large attendance on the occasion on which ladies were invited in March and June, slides were shown at the March dinner by R. Graham, E. S. Herbert, V. R. Ellwood, H. S. Scott Tucker and Rev. W. Weston. The usual ladies' dinner in October was not held owing to the difficulty caused by our change of restaurant, but the Annual Dinner, held at the Hotel Victoria, was largely attended. It was held on November 25th, but owing to the death of Queen Alexandra we were deprived of the presence of His Excellency, the Swiss Minister. The President of the Alpine Club, and Sir Martin Conway were present as the chief guests. In the special circumstances proceedings were not reported in the press.

A dinner to celebrate the 13th birthday of the Britannia Hut was held at the Grand Hotel, Saas Fee, on August 17th. Forty-two members and friends were present and Mr. J. A. B. Bruce, our Hon. Treasurer, took the Chair.

SUMMER HOLIDAYS, 1926.

Anyone who desires assistance in making up a climbing party for the summer, is requested to communicate with one of the Hon. Secretaries, who keep a list of members on the look-out for companions. Some very successful parties were arranged in 1925. But it is desirable to write in good time, not later than early in July, as the secretaries may themselves be in the Alps if applications are delayed. It is hoped that members, particularly beginners, will avail themselves freely of the help of the secretaries in this matter.

ANNUAL DONATION FROM GENEVA SECTION.

The Geneva Section has contributed £20 towards the expenses of the Association so that Members of the S.A.C. resident in this country may obtain, out of the subscriptions paid by them, some of the advantages which their Swiss colleagues enjoy, but from which we are debarred by living in this country.

OFFICERS OF THE ASSOCIATION.

Dr. H. L. R. Dent has been re-elected President for 1926. Vice-Presidents, Hon. Treasurer, Hon. Librarian, Hon. Auditor, the Hon. Secretaries and Hon. Solicitor for the ensuing year were re-elected at the Annual Meeting on November 25th (for names see inside cover). An additional Vice-President was added to the list in Mr. C. T. Lehmann, who at the same time remains as Hon. Librarian.

THE COMMITTEE.

The following retired from the Committee in accordance with Rule 7b; R. S. T. Chorley, Dr. V. C. Ellwood, R. E. C. Houghton, N. E. Odell, Mr. M. Bezencenet, one of the co-opted members also retired.

The following have been elected in their places:—Squadron-Leader E. B. Beauman, G. Steel, J. Baer, R. H. Sennett, R. B. Robertson.

Seven Committee meetings were held during the year.

FINANCE.

The accounts have been audited by Mr. W. Adams, the Hon. Auditor. There is a balance on Revenue for the year 1925 of £61 12s. 8d., but to this must be added the accumulated Balances of former years, making a total of £225 19s. 9d. The Life Membership Reserve Fund now stands at £475 invested in War Loan in the names of J. A. B. Bruce and W. M. Roberts as Trustees, also Deposit Note at Bank, £100. For further particulars see the Balance Sheet at the end of the Report.

NOTES ON CLUB HUTS.

The Cabane Britannia retains its popularity with mountaineers, even in a season so bad as that of 1925. It was visited by 744 persons of whom we regret to see that less than one third were members of the S.A.C. With one exception it is perhaps the most popular of the really high huts, situated as it is at a height of 10,200 feet. We may remind our newer members that this is the hut which the Association presented to the S.A.C. in 1912. An exact model of it is kept in the Club Room.

New Rules for Mountain Huts. The regulations for the upkeep and management of all mountain huts belonging to the S.A.C. were overhauled during the year and will be found in full in the May number of Die Alpen. The regulations are somewhat stricter than before in favour of the mountaineer and of the members of the S.A.C. One quarter of the places will be, in future, retained for members of the Club till 10 o'clock in those huts where there is not a special room for members. As before, the S.A.C. has priority in the allotment of places, but it is interesting to find that members of that new and flourishing Club—the Ladies' S.A.C.—comes before the members of the kindred clubs.

It is also laid down that those who intend to climb are to have precedure over the non-climbing tourist in the same category as themselves.

Even when a Hut has been reserved for a Section or Society one quarter of the places must be left for individual members of the Club. Moreover societies and schools may not reserve the Hut on Saturdays or Sundays. The old rule of charging the public 3 francs a night as against 1 franc for members still holds, and the wife and children (under 20 years of age) of a member are included in the same category as himself.

It is clear from the recent changes in the hut rules that it is more than ever desirable for British climbers to belong to the S.A.C., and, we hope, this Association too.

The great question of the sale of alcoholic liquors was debated at length and its prohibition approved.

We are thankful to hear that loudspeakers may not be installed in any hut.

Cards of Membership. New cards have been issued for 1926. Members should transfer their photos from their old card or send new one to our Hon. Treasurer for signature.

NEW HUTS, ETC. The old Weismies Inn, so well known to most of us, no longer exists as such. It is now a large and well appointed Club Hut, with places for 60 persons. It was opened on August 1st, 1925, by the Olten Section, at a cost of £1,600. It is said to be one of the finest in the Swiss Alps.

Another important change is the recent enlargement of the Matterhorn Hut.

REV. W. D. Monro, after expressing regret that no one more representative than himself had been found to propose the toast of the Alpine Club and Kindred Clubs, said:—

That as far as the S.A.C. was concerned, the duty of British climbers was clear. They could not learn mountaineering in the full sense in their own country; if they came to the Playground of Europe, as they had been doing for so many years, they ought to get to know the people to whom the mountains belonged, and the most obvious and direct method of doing so was to ally themselves with the S.A.C. Returning to the Alps after 25 years of neglect, he had been struck with the enormous increase of facilities now at the disposal of mountaineers; these were the direct work of the S.A.C., and called for the most hearty and personal recognition by British climbers. With regard to the Club to which he himself had once belonged, the fact that one of its clearly stated objects is to encourage people not merely to climb, but to know the mountains for their was sake, was something which would always make the

Alpine Club worthy of the hearty support of right minded people. To love mountain-climbing was excellent; to study, know and love the mountains, the grandest feature of God's world, was far more; and he could always propose with the utinost heartiness the health of clubs of every nationality which strove to promote knowledge so profitable to body, mind and soul.

MR. A. E. PORTER, 'AC.' responded to the toast of the "Alpine and Kindred Clubs," and said:—

Mr. Chairman, ladies and gentlemen: It is related of the great Lord Palmerston that he was entertaining members of his Cabinet to a whitebait luncheon at Greenwich. When replying to the toast of his health, he said: "Gentlemen, let us imitate these wise little fish: let us drink a great deal and say nothing." Whatever views there may be as to the wisdom of the first half of his advice, there is no doubt that the second half is peculiarly suited to myself, who, one of the least distinguished and worthy member of the oldest Alpine Club in existence, am called upon to respond to this toast.

It is true that I was climbing on the French-Italian frontier when war broke out in 1914, but I have to confess that, for reasons which I need not enter into, I did not again visit the Alps until the lure of the mountains brought me back a couple of years ago. In that year my only achievement worthy of record was the enticing of a youth away from a family party, whom I happened to overtake on the path to the Gornergoat, to come up the Riffelhorn with mc. We hadn't a rope with us, but, I am glad to say, we made a safe return.

This year my record has been almost as insignificant, and you will therefore understand why I feel considerably diffident in replying to the toast. I welcome, however, the opportunity it gives me of recording the deep debt of gratitude we poor foreign countries owe to our Swiss friends whenever we visit their entrancing country.

In conclusion, I would wish to thank Mr. Monro for the happy terms in which he has proposed the toast, and to you, ladies and gentlemen, for the cordial reception you have given it.

 M_R . J. Wanner Roussy, Treasurer of the Diablerets Section, also responded on behalf of the Swiss Alpine Club.

Mr. H. M. Gooch proposed the toast of the "Non-Members." He said:—

When Mr. Bruce kindly asked me to undertake this duty I had to consider my qualifications for the privilege accorded me. Perhaps my apology for accepting the invitation of addressing you this evening will be more acceptable if I mention I am one of the early life members of the British Association; that I was present on the occasion of the inauguration of the Britannia Hut, when our dinner took place at the Dom Hotel; and that it was my role to be staying at the Grand Hotel in 1914 when war was declared, and, with Mr. H. Edwards, followed the Guides of this Valley down to Stalden, after taking some photographs which are of special interest to-day. On the way down we met Herr Lagger, who was returning, and bade farewell to one who had done so much for the S.A.C. and the British Association. We all mourn his death and remember him with gratitude and honour.

I am thankful our Chaplain (Mr. Monro), in proposing the earlier toast, referred to the prominence given by the Alpine Club to that aspect of climbing which does not omit love of the mountains for their own sake. We cannot all reach the higher peaks, but the coveted badge "A.C." is not withheld from those who, on other grounds, have earned distinction and reward for attainments in Alpine climbing. There is what we may call the spirit of the mountains, fostering amity, so essential to-day, as well as adventure. We think of the friendships we have formed and found through our membership of the British Association; we love the mountains, not only for themselves, but for their surrounding hills and valleys, the flowers, the solitudes. Much could be said on the subject, but speaking this evening from my heart, and desiring to be brief, I ask you to drink to the health of non-members and express the hope that all such will, before the evening closes, intimate to Mr. Bruce their desire to join the ever increasing ranks of the membership of the British Association of the Swiss Alpine Club.

CANON LAMPEN, in responding to the toast of the "Guests," said:—

That he must have been chosen for that duty to represent a large public who did not climb. Certainly no one was less able to scale heights than himself. But his appreciation of such an Association as the Swiss Alpine Club, and his admiration for climbers, was perhaps the greater because he himself would certainly, if it were at all possible, fall

into a crevasse. He would voice the feelings of all who could not climb, and say how they enjoyed these glorious mountains and recognised the sterling qualities of the people who lived among them. Such a Society as the Swiss Alpine Club was never more needed than in our day, when persons of all classes and in greater numbers than ever visited this lovely country. The Club could teach us all the high code which inspired the mountaineers of the past and hand on the etiquette of the mountains to the coming generation.

"The Ladies," proposed by Canon Salwey in a most humorous speech (unfortunately lost), was responded to by Madame Mottu in a spirited speech.

Mr. E. S. HERBERT proposed "The Chairman":-

Ladies and gentlemen: I am the lucky man upon whom has been laid the acceptable duty of proposing the health of our chairman, Mr. Bruce.

I arrived here late this afternoon after a longish day, and Mr. Bruce met me with a tale of woc. He had been going all round the village seeking a chairman for to-night's dinner, but had failed and so was compelled to undertake the office himself. Ladies and gentlemen, was there ever a more perfect instance of the right man in the right place?

First of all, if it were not for Mr. Bruce should we be here at all to-night enjoying this excellent dinner? Does not the Association of British Members of the Swiss Alpine Club owe its existence to the energy and enthusiasm of Mr. Bruce?

When I first came to Switzerland I went home with the settled opinion that all climbers were born fools. But I came again and was bitten by the desire to climb, which you all know so well. Wishing to find out something more about it I consulted the only climbing book in my possession-Baedecker-and there I found that if one wished to have particulars concerning the Swiss Alpine Club application should be made to one J. A. B. Bruce, Selborne Lodge, Austen Road, Guildford. So I wrote to him, and his reply was: "Come to our next monthly dinner." I went; not without a good deal of trepidation, for I had come to regard climbers as rather a race apart. The welcome I received was a passable imitation of the joy that is said to be in the presence of the angels over one sinner that repenteth. Mr. Bruce was the author and originator of that welcome, and from that time onwards he has not ceased to add fuel to the fire of my enthusiasm for the mountains nor to fan its flame. I am very grateful to him.

Forgive my being personal, but what Mr. Bruce has done for me is only typical of what he has done for many other new members.

And then, too, if it had not been for Mr. Bruce, should we have had the Britannia Hut? Many of you have been there to-day, and no doubt the guardian has saved the lives of others of you from time to time. His tea saved mine this afternoon, and I drank Mr. Bruce's health in innumerable cups of it. For the same reason I ask you to drink it again with me now.

The CHAIRMAN, in replying, proposed the health of Dr. Dubi, the Lagger family and the good people of the Saas Valley.

ASSOCIATION OF BRITISH MEMBERS

SWISS ALPINE CLUB.

RULES.

1. NAME.

The name of the Association shall be "The Association of British Members of the Swiss Alpine Club."

2. OBJECTS.

(a) To encourage British Alpinists to support the Swiss Alpine Club in all its work, by becoming members of a section of that body.

(b) To collect funds and present to the S.A.C. a club hut, and for such other purposes as the Association may from time to time determine.

(c) To form a body able to present a collective opinion to

the S.A.C. on any question of Alpine interest.

(d) To promote among British members the sociability which is so conspicuous a feature of the Swiss sections, but from which we are necessarily debarred by living at a distance from the head-quarters of our sections. This is done by Monthly Informal Dinners, Lectures, Smoking "At Homes," and showing Alpine Slides on the Lantern at the Club Room, 38, Panton Street, S.W.1.

3. CONSTITUTION.

Officers -President

Vice-Presidents
Two Hon. Secretaries
Hon. Treasurer
Hon. Auditor

To be elected annually,
in November or Dec.

with power to the Committee to increase the number of Officers by two if it is so desired.

Members—1. Ordinary. The qualification for ordinary membership shall be "membership of some section of the S.A.C."

2. Honorary. To be elected at the discretion of the Committee.

4. SUBSCRIPTION.

The Annual Subscription to the Association shall be 10/-per annum, payable at election. The payment of £4 4s. shall be considered as equivalent to the annual payment of 10/-.

For those elected before 1921 it is optional whether they pay 5/- or 10/- subscription or £2 2s. 0d. or £4 4s. 0d.

for Life Membership.

Annual Subscriptions shall be due on 1st January of each year and any member whose subscription shall not have been paid on or before 1st April shall cease to be a member of the Association, but may be reinstated on payment of arrears, at the discretion of the Committee. Any member joining after the 1st November shall not be required to pay his subscription for the ensuing year.

5. GENERAL MEETINGS.

There shall be at least two General Meetings in the year, viz., The Annual General Meeting and a dinner in November or December, a more informal meeting in June, and such Winter meetings as the Committee may think fit.

8. POWERS OF THE COMMITTEE.

(a) The Committee may, by a two-third majority of those present, call upon any member to resign if they consider his conduct to be incompatible with Membership of the Association, but such member shall have the right of appeal to the next general or special meeting, which shall have the power of confirming or annulling, by a two-third majority, the decision of the Committee.

(b) The Committee, on the requisition of 12 members, may call, at any time, a Special General Meeting, provided that seven clear days' notice shall be given to all members of such a Special General Meeting, together with full information as to the place, time, and business to be

transacted.

(c) The Committee shall have the power to submit any new proposal affecting the Association to a General or Special General Meeting of the members of the Association.

7. COMMITTEE.

The Committee shall consist of ex-officio members and ordinary members.

- (a) The ex-officio members shall be the officers of the Association for the time being.
- (b) The ordinary members of the Committee shall be 12 in number; and shall be elected at the Annual Meeting of the Association; one-third of these shall retire annually and shall be eligible for re-election after * one year has elapsed. The Committee may co-opt not more than three additional members, one of whom must retire yearly; the mode of election and the manner of retirement to rest with the Committee. Five members shall constitute a quorum.

The Committee may suggest names for Officers and Committee, but this is not to be taken as precluding any two members from nominating candidates, whose consent, however, must be previously obtained.

At least three weeks' notice of the Annual Meeting shall be given to every member; and nominations for Officers and Committee must be sent in to the secretaries at least ten days before the Annual Meeting. In the event of more candidates being nominated than there are vacancies the election shall be by ballot.

* Year ends Sist December.

8. ACCOUNTS.

The accounts of the Association shall be audited in January and presented by the Treasurer at the next General Meeting of the Club, and shall be published with the Annual Report.

9. CASUAL VACANCIES.;

The Committee shall have power to fill up casual vacancies amongst the Officers or Committee; and those chosen shall serve for the unexpired period of office to which the member whom they succeed was entitled.

10. ROOM FOR MEETINGS and LIBRARY.

The Committee shall have power to hire premises for the purposes of the Association, and have done so at Comedy Restaurant, 38, Panton-street, S.W. 1.

11 AN ANNUAL REVIEW.

The Committee shall have power to publish an Annual Review and appoint an Editor when they think the funds of the Club will permit.

12. ALTERATION OF RULES.

A General Meeting shall have power, by a majority of not less than two-thirds of the members present and voting to alter or add to the existing rules of the Club.

13. REGULATIONS.

The Committee shall have power to make such regulations, not being inconsistent with these rules, as they think to be for the well-being of the Club.

THE CHAIRMAN.

The Chairman whether at a General Meeting or at a Meeting of the Committee shall in case of an equality of votes have a second or casting vote.

15. MONTHLY INFORMAL DINNERS.

These are held at our Club Room, Comedy Restaurant, 38, Panton Street, S.W.1., on 4th Wednesday in each month. Price 5/6.

RETIRED LIFE MEMBERS.

Life Members of the Association who have ceased to be members of the Swiss Alpine Club may remain members of the Association and enjoy its privileges excepting that they shall not be eligible to fill any office of the Association or to vote at any of the meetings.

HOW TO BELONG TO THE SWISS ALPINE CLUB.

Those who do not yet belong to the Swiss Alpine Club and desire to do so, can be put up at once. They should write to the Treasurer, J. A. B. Bruce, Selborne Lodge, Guildford, and state whether they wish to join a French, German, or Italian speaking section. *The subscription varies slightly in the various sections, e.g., in Geneva 30 francs a year and 20 france entrance fee. The Association can arrange to pay the subscription to the S.A.C. yearly, or will supply Banker's Forms for that purpose. If the first year's subscription and entrance fee is sent the candidate can be elected at once. If he wishes to obtain the full advantage of membership he should also enclose a small photograph of himself, this will be endorsed by our Treasurer and returned on his card of membership. If, in addition, he wishes to belong to our Association in England, the subscription is only 10/- a year or £4 4s. Od. for life.

The Central Committee of the Swiss Alpine Club have cordially approved of the formation of our Society, and most of the British members have joined our Association.

* The subscription in English money varies slightly also with the rate of exchange

ADVANTAGES OF BELONGING TO THE SWISS ALPINE CLUB.

Members of the Club obtain reductions on certain Swiss Railways (e.g., half-price on Zermatt Railway), half-price at certain Huts; a RIGHT of entry at the Club Huts, instead of being there on SUFFERANCE; a monthly magazine called Die Alpen in French, German and Italian, and other advantages.

A good feeling is created amongst the Swiss when they see British climbers, who use their Huts, contributing to their

support by becoming members of the S.A.C.

Informal Dinners (5/6) are held by the British Members at their Club Room, Comedy Restaurant, 38. Panton-street, Leicester-square, S.W.I., on the 4th Wednesday in each month (except August and December), at which members who are interested in climbing meet and become acquainted with one another. Lantern slides are sometimes shown after the dinner. When Ladies may be asked notice will be given.
